### Library event "unlocked the idea that I could play that well"

## Orchestra musician first saw bassoon at library event

By his 14th birthday, Owen Polkinghorn was already interested in classical music. He was playing clarinet in school and doing well, but wasn't sure if he wanted to focus on that instrument.

For his birthday, his mother, Bonnie Polkinghorn, took him to the Northwest Santa Rosa Library to see a performance by the Santa Rosa Symphony woodwind quintet. That's when he first saw a musician perform on the bassoon, an uncommon woodwind with a double reed.

"When we went to the performance, I planned to ask the clarinet player how to improve and get better, then I heard the bassoon and I really liked how the bassoon player spoke so passionately about the instrument and about music."

Owen went back to his Piner High School band director and asked if he could switch to the bassoon. "First, I asked if they even had a bassoon. They did, so we got a reed, fixed it up and I played it for two years in the school band."

Owen's enthusiasm helped reinvigorate the band program at

Piner, which had been cut due to budget issues.

When he graduated, he went on to Sacramento State, where he studied and played, and graduated with a teaching credential.

Now, he divides his time between teaching and performing music. While he pursues his Master's in Music at Bowling Green State University in Ohio, he has performed with the Detroit Opera, and he teaches at the Detroit Civic Youth Ensemble, part of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra.

What's ahead for Owen? "I would love to have a full-time performance career, but I'll be teaching as well. I love the idea of bringing up the next generation of musicians."

Owen and his mother credit the library experience as a pivotal moment for Owen as a teenager. "I was playing music and it was fun, but I was stumped about what to do in college. That performance unlocked the idea that I could play that well, and it led me to contacts and support from the Santa Rosa Symphony. Seeing that performance at the library was a catalyst."

Bonnie is proud of her son's

accomplishments and appreciative that the library offers arts and culture programming.
