FROM THE BRANCH MANAGER

Dear Friends,

Progress towards our building refresh seems to be gaining momentum! The final plans are being reviewed by the City of Petaluma, and we expect permits to be approved soon. As you may have read in the Press Democrat newspaper article on January 7, 2024, the next step after full plan approval and permits is putting the contract out to bid. Given the size and complexity of the project, we are not able to pinpoint a timeframe yet, but we hope to see the refresh start this spring.

While the building will remain closed for the remainder of 2024, we will be offering library services from the Kenilworth Teen Center (KTC) next door at 150 Fairgrounds Drive. In addition to a small collection of children's library materials and new books and DVDs for teens and adults, the temporary location will contain a laptop kiosk for in-library computer use, a charging station, and the all-important printer/copier machine, along with plenty of space for picking up hold requests. Plans are underway to construct a temporary deck over the KTC patio where we can hold events such as the summer Lunch at the Library for children, family storytimes, and more, outdoors under a tent.

The Friends of the Library's generosity in funding library programs such as the 10th annual LumaCon! Comic Convention on Feb. 3, and contributing significantly to the refresh project is much appreciated!

Meanwhile, several popular library events are coming up soon: *Petaluma Conversations* Tuesdays 2/6-2/27, *Talking Wood African Music* on 2/17, AARP Tax Aide on Wednesdays 2/28-3/20, *Petaluma 1954 in Photographs with Harlan Osborne* on 2/28, and the *Succulent Swap* with the Master Gardeners on 3/30.

A HOME FOR THE EXTRA PAPERBACKS

Librarian, Michael Powell, works at the Main Adult Detention Facility under a joint contract between the Sonoma County Sheriff's Office and Sonoma County Public Library Adult Literacy Division. He teaches a literacy class once a week, circulates books to residents as a function of the in-house library and provides book trucks to housing units once per week. Meeting the reading needs of over 750 people requires lots of books. Lots of books. Over 4,200 books are supplied per month averaging 4 books per individual. As the books must be paperback the lifespan is severely limited. He feels very fortunate to have Friends of the Petaluma Library open their stock for residents of the Main Adult Detention Facility. He relies on Friends of the Library groups to help meet the needs of those less fortunate. Reading is a very important factor in passing time and is a valuable tool for engaging in an activity that will have positive results. They are hungry for books. Having a wide variety of books helps build literacy and broaden minds. He extends a very warm and big Thank You, Petaluma Friends of the Library for helping those who have perhaps made poor life choices but are seeking ways to improve. Reading is a key and the Friends are providing an important tool.

HISTORY ROOM

The Petaluma History Room has been busy getting ready for the upcoming events:

1. Because the theme for this year's Black History Month is "African Americans and the Arts", we are partnering with the Petaluma Blacks for Community Development to host Keenan Webster, a musician specializing in the instruments of West Africa. On Saturday February 17, he will take us on a mesmerizing journey across the continent using indigenous instruments. All ages will find this captivating music compelling.

2. Harlan Osborne's presentation on Wednesday February 28 at 6:30 will cover the year: 1954 Petaluma. This will be a wonderful picture journey through the year as seen from the lens of Cee-Jay photographers. Harlan will talk about each photo and we can compare what each spot looks like today. As part of our outreach program, the Petaluma Library and the Friends of the Petaluma Library donated more than a 100 books to support the schools, teachers and community of San Miguel, Tzinacapaan, Mexico through a non profit Quetzal Ecology based in Rohnert Park, CA, (quetzalecology.com). The books ranged from children's books to advanced level.

The FOPL has also donated foreign language instruction books and dictionaries in Italian, French, German, Danish, and Chinese to both Petaluma and Casa Grande high schools. In addition the Friends donated a box of art focus books to help with a Petaluma Art Center fund-raiser.

The Friends also restock magazines in gyms, laundromats, and the Boys and Girls Club for the pleasure of reading.

We have also sold foreign language books, left over from our book sales to Copperfield. Our donated books are well taken cared for.
