



A propulsive biography about groundbreaking political activist Emma Goldman from National Book Award Finalist Deborah Heiligman.




Hick: The Trailblazing Journalist Who Captured Eleanor Roosevelt's Heart











Wake: The Hidden History of Women-Led Slave Revolts





by Elana K. Arnold (she/her) - Y ARNOLD






